

The Board

The Board is the Authority's decision-making body. Strictly speaking, it is the Polynesian Competition Authority. It takes up the files for decision only after the Investigation Department has carried out its investigations and necessary analyses. The Board therefore takes a fresh look at the file submitted to it and generally hears the parties before deliberating on its own.

It has five members: the Chair, in a permanent capacity, and four non-permanent members.

The Chair was appointed for a non-renewable period of six years by the ministerial order No. 913 CM of 09 July 2015 adopted by in the Council of Ministers, after a unanimous opinion of the Budgetary and Financial Control Commission of the Assembly of French Polynesia.

The Board of the Authority is completed by four members, appointed by ministerial order No. 2133 CM of 25 September 2019, for a period of four years, renewable once.

The mandates of the Board Chair and members are not revocable, except in cases strictly defined by the Competition Code.

ALINE BALDASSARI

Having extensive professional and associative experience in the pearl farming sector, she has been a member of the Economic, Social and Cultural Council - CESC (now CESEC) for more than ten years and in particular, within this institution, she was rapporteur for French Polynesia's bill relating to the Competition Code. In addition, she was also a member of the Council for Strategic Reforms of French Polynesia.

YOUSSEF GUENZOU

Holding a PhD in private law and Senior Lecturer at the University of French Polynesia, Youssef Guenzoui has taught competition law for several years at the University of Paris 13 Sorbonne Paris Cité. His doctoral thesis focuses on the "notion of agreement in private law" which includes an important part dedicated to competition law, like many other publications he wrote.

CHRISTIAN MONTET

Professor of economics at the University of French Polynesia and member of the Governance and Insular Development Laboratory. His research focuses on the application of microeconomics and game theory to competition issues and business strategy. He is the author of numerous books and articles on economics and competition.

MARIE-CHRISTINE LUBRANO

A former student at ENA (National School of Administration), Marie-Christine LUBRANO has been Advisor to the Administrative Court, including 17 years at the Administrative Court of French Polynesia. She also has been a member of the Inspectorate General of Administration in Paris and a member of the inter-ministerial mission investigating public procurement.

Finally, she chaired the Territorial Audio-visual Committee of French Polynesia until 2014. She now teaches at the University of French Polynesia.
